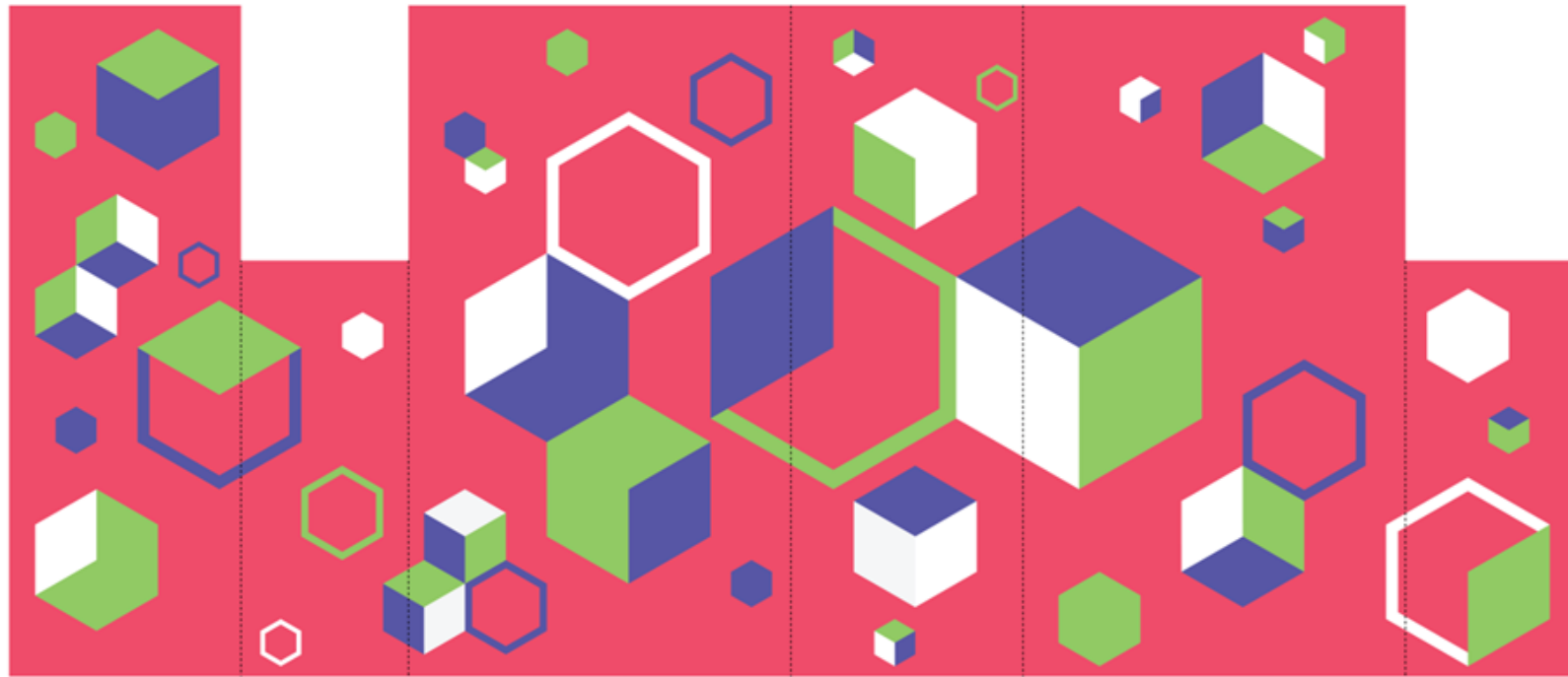


# Traffic Cabinet Art Wrap Project

7. Court Square and N Main Street – Artist – Rosa Cruz



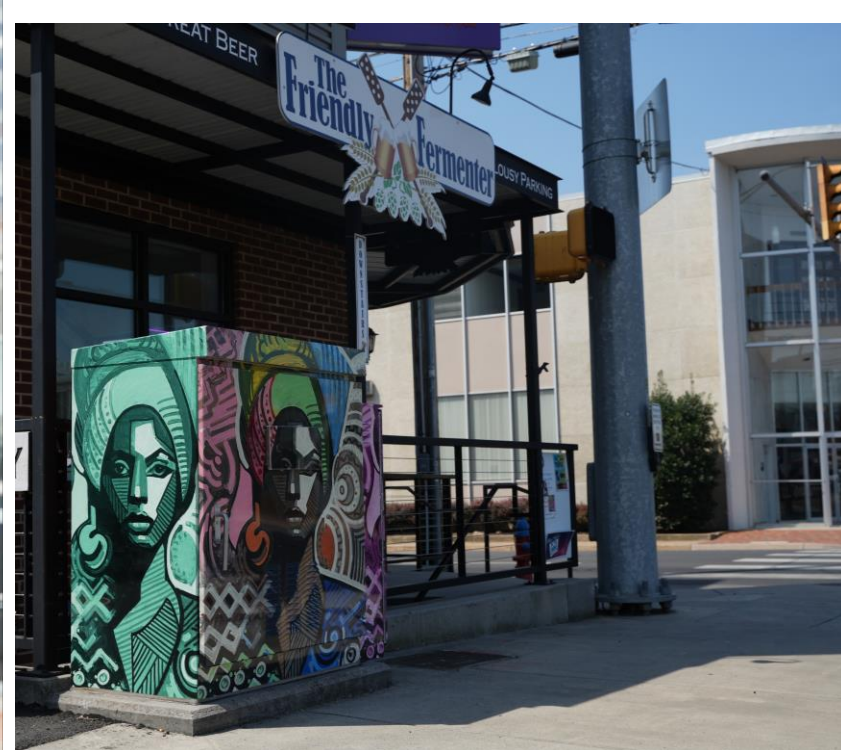

8. East Market Street and North Mason Street – Artist – Ver Ikeseh







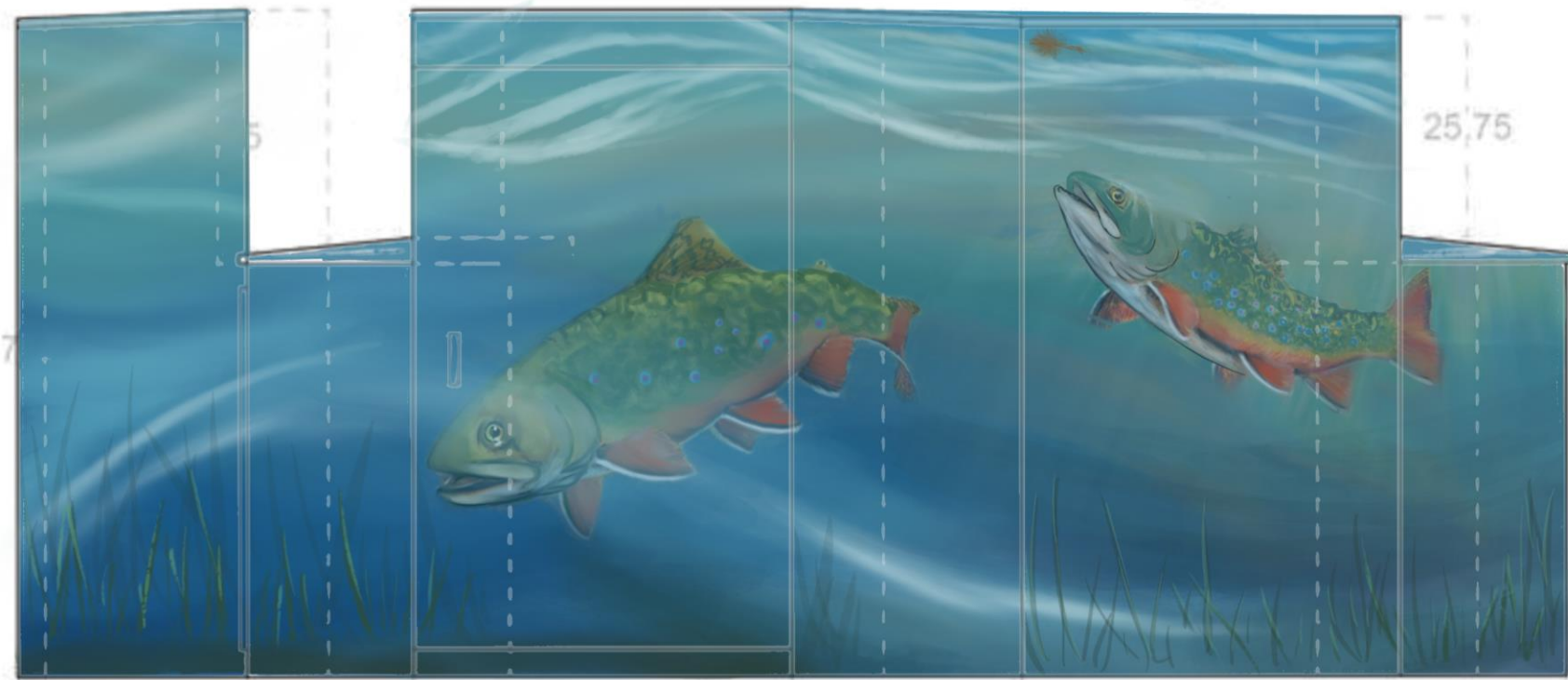
9. South Main Street and West Water Street – Artist – Lana Lambert
